## **LESSON 6**

## Genesis 41:1-14 • Pharaoh has a dream

This chapter retells Pharaoh's dreams three times! We'll wait until the <u>third</u> retelling to discuss content of the dreams, since this is when Joseph interprets the meaning.

Pharaoh's distress about his dreams prompts his cupbearer (butler) to finally remember Joseph, still in prison, who had interpreted his dreams two years earlier.

in prison, who had incorpresed the dreams every early earliers		
And so, Joseph is finally brought forth to meet Pharaoh.		
Question: What does Joseph's physical condition tell you about the conditions of the prison?		
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For Joseph, waiting another two years for something to happen after seeing the cupbearer return to Pharaoh must have been so agonizing: yet, God's timing is always perfect!		
What do these passages say about God's timing? What should our response be?

Once again, we'll save Joseph's the dream interpretation for the next pass. The key in this passage is Joseph's <u>response</u> to Pharaoh! It is amazing!
Look at verse 16 very carefully: What does Joseph say?
Why is this so amazing? What does it say about Joseph's faith?
Put yourself in his sandals—what might your response to Pharaoh be in the same situation?

## Genesis 41:25-37 • Joseph interprets the dream

But—to quickly summarize, (and I'm sure you know this by now!) Pharaoh has two similar dreams, one of cows, and one of corn stalks, and in each, the seven plump and healthy ones are swallowed up by seven withered and ugly ones that follow after.

In this first telling of the dreams, the focus is on that fact that the dreams are incredibly distressing to Pharaoh, and he calls for his wise men and magicians, but none can interpret the dream! But, to

Joseph, there is no mystery, and God's plan is extremely clear to him: Seven years of plenty will be
followed by seven years of famine.

And, because the dreams are repeated, this will <u>definitely</u> happen. They have to take God's warning very seriously. Joseph gives advice: Save up 1/5<sup>th</sup> each year during the years of plenty to get you through the years of famine.

ve often wondered: Did Joseph say this hoping to be the man selected to rule during the famin or was he simply giving godly advice and expecting nothing in return?	
What do you think?	
But, there is no answer to this question in the text. We can't read Joseph's mind at this point. But–knowing how Joseph humbly served in every situation before, we can get a pretty good guess at his intentions!
